GOSPEL READINGS FOR THE WEEK

Behind the tenth chapter of the Gospel of St. Mark may lie an early Christian catechism on important aspects of the Christian life. The catechism dealt with marriage-divorce, family-children and wealth. This week we have the first two parts and next Sunday the third part of the catechism. The central issue in the first part is the question of divorce and remarriage. Jesus' stance is radical, that is, no divorce and remarriage. He acknowledges, implicitly from Deut. 24.1-4, the possibility of divorce-remarriage from the Mosaic Law, but he draws his teaching from Genesis that man and woman become one flesh, and, therefore, there cannot be divorce, that is, the splitting up of the one flesh. The ideal of Christian marriage, grounded in God's very creative act is being held up by our Lord. His position is in contrast to both Jewish and Roman law, both of which permitted divorce. In the second part of the catechism to do with family-children, go to verse 16: "He embraced (the children) and blessed them, placing his hands upon them." The verse has a liturgical feel to it. Minus the water, it almost sounds like the baptism of infants! Some scholars (e.g., Joachim Jeremias, Oscar Cullmann) have seen in this passage a justification by the early Church of the practice of infant baptism when entire households were being baptized. The kingdom of God belongs to children because the kingdom is gift, and children are receptive. The kingdom is not for those who make claims to power or status.

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St. Joseph Faithful Protector of Mother and Child (October Respect Life Month)

The infant Christ "came into our world in a state of great vulnerability. He needed to be defended, protected, cared for and raised by Joseph" (PC 5). The humble and often hidden carpenter of Nazareth accompanied Mary in her pregnancy, assisted at the birth of the Messiah in a stable, presented Jesus in the Temple, fled with his family far from their homeland to protect them, and lovingly raised Jesus as his own son in the years to come.

While the angel of the Lord appeared to Mary to announce that she would bring forth the Savior of the world, it was revealed to Joseph in a series of dreams how God's plans would be brought to fulfillment. As Pope Francis highlights, "God trusted Joseph, as did Mary, who found in him someone who would not only save her life, but would always provide for her and her child" (PC 5).

Like every other human family, the Holy Family had to confront real and concrete challenges. Yet, "in every situation, Joseph declared his own 'fiat'" (PC 3). His "yes" to the Lord meant that regardless of the hardship and personal sacrifice to himself, he consistently chose to put the needs of Mary and Jesus before his own. Joseph's devotion helps reveal to us our own call to show special care for the lives of those whom God has entrusted to us.

During this Year of St. Joseph, each of us can find in him "an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble" (PC, Intro). Joseph shows us how to say "yes" to life, despite our own fears, frailties, and weaknesses. For it is Joseph who was "chosen by God to guide the beginnings of the history of redemption. He was the true 'miracle' by which God saves the child and his mother" (PC 5). May we, too, be miracles in the lives of those who are most in need, especially at the beginning and end of life. Dear St. Joseph, you who were "able to turn a problem into a possibility by trusting always in divine providence" (PC 5), help us to imitate your faithful trust and courage. Saint of the week: October 6 Blessed Marie-Rose Durocher

(1811-1849 Eulalie Durocher was the youngest of 10 children in a pious Quebec family; three brothers became priests and two sisters also became nuns. Because of ill health, Eulalie attended school sporadically and was rejected by several religious orders. For 12 years she helped one of her priest-brothers in his parish, organizing charitable works and the first Confraternity of Mary in Canada. In 1843, with two friends and episcopal permission, she founded the Sisters of the Holy Names of Jesus and Mary to educate poor youths, especially in the countryside. As Mother Marie-Rose, she led the

(1811-1849) Eulalie Durocher era la menor de 10 hermanos de una familia piadosa en Quebec; tres de sus hermanos fueron sacerdotes y también dos hermanas fueron religiosas. Debido a su delicada salud, Eulalie asistió esporádicamente a la escuela y fue rechazada por varias órdenes religiosas. A lo largo de 12 años, ella ayudó a uno de sus hermanos sacerdotes en su parroquia, organizando obras de caridad y la primera Confraternidad de María en Canadá. En 1843, con dos amigas y un permiso episcopal, fundó Las Hermanas de los Santos Nombres de Jesús y

María a fin de educar a las jóvenes pobres, especialmente, en las zonas rurales. Convertida en la Madre Marie-Rose, ella dirigió la congregación hasta su temprana muerte; fue beatificada en 1982. XXVII Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario

1era. Lectura: Gn 18, 24; **Salmo:** 127; **2da. Lectura:** Heb 2, 8-11; **Evangelio:** Mc 10, 2-16

"Y serán los dos una sola carne"

Detrás del décimo capítulo del Evangelio de San Marcos puede haber un catecismo cristiano primitivo sobre aspectos importantes de la vida cristiana. El catecismo trataba sobre el matrimonio-divorcio, la familia-hijos y la riqueza. Esta semana tenemos las dos primeras partes y el próximo domingo la tercera parte del catecismo. El tema central en la primera parte es la cuestión del divorcio y el nuevo matrimonio. La postura de Jesús es radical, es decir, no se divorcia ni se vuelve a casar. Él reconoce, implícitamente de Deut. 24.1-4, la posibilidad de divorciarse y casarse de nuevo de la Ley mosaica, pero él extrae su enseñanza del Génesis donde el hombre y la mujer se vuelven una sola carne y, por lo tanto, no puede haber divorcio, es decir, la división de una sola carne. Nuestro Señor sostiene el ideal del matrimonio cristiano, basado en el acto creativo de Dios. Su posición contrasta tanto con la ley judía como con la romana, las cuales permitían el divorcio. En la segunda parte del catecismo sobre la familia-hijos, vaya al versículo 16: "Abrazó (a los niños) y los bendijo, colocando sus manos sobre ellos". El verso tiene un toque litúrgico. Casi suena como el bautismo de bebés! Algunos eruditos (por ejemplo, Joachim Jeremias, Oscar Cullmann) han visto en este pasaje una justificación de la Iglesia primitiva de la práctica del bautismo infantil cuando se bautizaban hogares enteros. El reino de Dios pertenece a los niños porque el reino es un regalo y los niños son receptivos. El reino no es para aquellos que reclaman poder o estatus.
