GOSPEL READINGS FOR THE WEEK

Mon. Mk 2:18-22 Tues. Mk. 2: 23-28 Wed. Mk. 3 1--6 Thurs. Mk. 3: 7-12 Fri. Mk. 3: 13-19 Sat. Mk. 3: 20-21 Within the scene of the marriage feast at Cana we find the first occurrence of the theme of "the hour" which, Jesus specifies in response to his Mother, has not yet arrived. Jesus is referring, coherently with what John will observe later in 7,30 and 8,20, to the hour of his death. This entire episode has to be comprehended against the horizon of the progressive revelation that Jesus will make of himself so as to give rise to faith. The miracle that Jesus works in Cana, as it is the first "sign," has the goal of revealing his glory which means to say his identity as the Son of God and the revealer of the Father, while, simultaneously, it allows the believers to perceive this very glory. Therefore, the miracle has a radical function in the order of faith, insofar as it can be welcomed only within faith, but also is


intended to bring us to that faith. By prodigiously giving the "good wine," that represents the full and perfect revelation, Jesus manifests himself symbolically and, implicitly, invites the individual to believe in his person. Those who taste the water changed into wine by Jesus now receive within the symbolic sign of the good and abundant wine that which they will receive through faith. Thus, the believers will obtain forgiveness for sins and eternal life at the moment of the ultimate "hour," when Jesus within his paschal mystery will realize the supreme revelation of Love himself through his own death. Ordinary Time

The end of the Christmas season was marked by the Baptism of the Lord, January 12 this year, and we have now moved into the season of Ordinary Time. Despite its name, there is nothing inherently "ordinary" about this season of the year. The term ordinary is just used because the weeks are numbered in an ordinal way—the Third Week in Ordinary Time, the Fourth Week in Ordinary Time, and so on. Liturgical calendars were not always structured this way. In the earliest days of the Church, every Sunday was treated as an Easter Sunday—there was no distinction in the season for Christmas, Lent, and Easter. While we no longer treat every Sunday as Easter Sunday, "Sunday is the preeminent day for the liturgical assembly" (CCC, no. 1167). In addition to participating in the Eucharistic liturgy, in Ordinary Time, Sundays remain days that should be set aside for prayer, reflection, rest, and time with family.

Prayers for Life

The over 56 million abortions since the 1973 decisions of Roe v. Wade and Doe v. Bolton reflect with heartbreaking magnitude what Pope Francis means by a "throwaway culture." However, we have great trust in God's providence. We are reminded time and again in Scripture to seek the Lord's help, and as people of faith, we believe that our prayers are heard. As individuals, we are called to observe this day through the penitential practices of prayer, fasting and/or almsgiving. Saint of the week: Jan. 20th St. Sebastian.

(Died c. 288) According to the many legends surrounding Sebastian, he was born in Gaul and raised in Milan. Though a Christian, he joined the imperial army at Rome about 283. He made converts of officials and jailers, effected cures and urged Christian prisoners to stay strong in their faith. He was named captain of the praetorian guards, but the emperor, upon finding out that he was a Christian, ordered his execution. Shot with arrows and left for dead, Sebastian survived and was nursed back to life. Later, he denounced the

(Fallecio C 288) (Según las muchas leyendas que rodean a Sebastián, él nació en Galia y creció en Milán. A pesar de ser cristiano, se unió al ejército imperial en Roma en el año 283. Logró convertir a funcionarios y carceleros, efectuó sanaciones e instó a los prisioneros cristianos a mantenerse firmes en su fe. Fue nombrado capitán de los guardias pretorianos pero cuando el emperador se enteró que Sebastián era cristiano, ordenó su ejecución. Le dispararon flechas y fue dado por muerto pero Sebastián sobrevivió y fue curado y devuelto a la

vida. Más adelante, él denunció al emperador por su crueldad hacia los cristianos y el emperador lo hizo matar a golpes. Dentro de la escena de las bodas de Caná encontramos la primera aparición del tema de "la hora" que, precisa Jesús en respuesta a su Madre, aún no ha llegado. Jesús se está refiriendo, en coherencia con lo que Juan observará más adelante en 7,30 y 8,20, a la hora de su muerte. Todo este episodio debe ser comprendido en el horizonte de la revelación progresiva que Jesús hará

de sí mismo para suscitar la fe. El milagro que Jesús obra en Caná, como primer "signo", tiene por objeto revelar su gloria, es decir, su identidad como Hijo de Dios y revelador del Padre, al mismo tiempo que permite a los creyentes para percibir esta misma gloria. Por tanto, el milagro tiene una función radical en el orden de la fe, en la medida en que sólo puede ser acogido dentro de la fe, pero también está destinado a llevarnos a esa fe. Al dar prodigiosamente el "buen vino", que representa la revelación plena y perfecta, Jesús se manifiesta simbólicamente e, implícitamente, invita al individuo a creer en su persona. Los que prueban el agua convertida en vino por Jesús reciben ahora dentro de la señal simbólica del buen y abundante vino lo que recibirán por medio de la fe. Así, los creyentes obtendrán el perdón de los pecados y la vida eterna en el momento de la "hora" última, cuando Jesús dentro de su misterio pascual realizará la suprema revelación del mismo Amor a través de su propia muerte.Fr. Week of Prayer for Christian Unity January 18-25

The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity has a history of over 100 years, in which Christians around the world have taken part in an octave of prayer for visible Christian unity. By annually



observing the WPCU, Christians move toward the fulfillment of Jesus' prayer at the Last Supper "that they all may be one." *(cf. John 17:21)*

The theme for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in 2022 was selected by the Middle East Council of Churches and originates from the churches in Lebanon. Present times in Lebanon are extremely difficult and economically disastrous. All this combined with the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic have made the situation quite stressful. The power of prayer in solidarity with those who suffer is a demonstration of Christian unity and a sign of communion.

The theme, taken from the second chapter of the Gospel according to Matthew, is the Epiphany. Each year in January, the Church recalls the visit of the Magi to Bethlehem, highlighting God's invitation to all of humanity to a new covenant in the Incarnation of Christ. In the Eastern Churches, Epiphany is joined to the mystery of the Baptism of Christ, a baptism all Christians hold in common as testimony to their faith in the Son of God.
