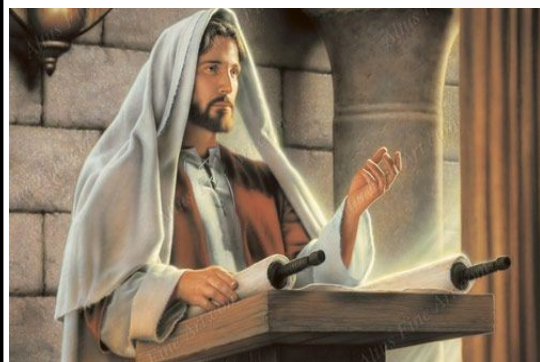

Over the course of the next 30+ weeks of Ordinary Time, we will journey through Luke's version of Jesus' public life. Ordinary in this sense simply means the ordinal or numbered Sundays, and this season is every bit as important as any other in the liturgical year as it contains Jesus' teachings and interactions with those he encountered in his ministry. Luke begins by acknowledging that he is not the only one to record Jesus' words and deeds. He probably wrote about 85 CE. As in Acts, his other work, Luke dedicates his Gospel to one Theophilus. Whether or not this was an historical personage scholars have yet to determine. Then today's reading moves past the infancy narratives to Chapter 4 which might well be titled Jesus' inaugural address. In his hometown synagogue, Jesus is asked to read the weekly passage from the prophets. You might say he was the first lector. Any adult male in the congregation might be tapped for that honor and was then expected to comment on the reading; in other words, to give the homily. The passage from Isaiah was familiar to all who heard him. His remarks were short, but many did not find them sweet as we will learn next week. However, as in modern inaugural addresses, Jesus here lays out his platform, telling his friends and neighbors what they can expect from him in the weeks, months, and years to come. Saint of the week: Jan. 28th
St. Thomas Aquinas

Thomas so shocked his noble Italian family when he entered the Dominicans about 1244 that his brothers imprisoned him for a year. But he would not yield, and studied under St. Albert the Great, becoming a master of theology in 1256. For the rest of his brief life, the “dumb ox,” as he was dubbed, taught, preached and wrote, producing the monumental “Summa Theologica.” His thinking became enormously influential in later centuries and he was named a Doctor of the Church in 1567. “St Thomas Aquinas, with farsighted wisdom, succeeded in establishing a fruitful confrontation with the Arab and Hebrew thought of his time, to the point that he was considered an ever up-to-date teacher of dialogue with other cultures and religions. He knew how to present that wonderful Christian synthesis of reason and faith which today too, for the Western civilization, is a precious patrimony to draw from for an effective dialogue with the great cultural and religious traditions of the East and South of the world.” —Pope Benedict XVI, Angelus, January 28, 2007 United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, Washington, DC. Santo de la semana: Enero 28
Santo Tomas de Aquino

Cuando Tomás ingresó a los dominicos alrededor del año 1244, sorprendió tanto a su noble familia italiana que sus hermanos lo encarcelaron durante un año. Pero él no cejó en su empeño y estudió con Alberto Magno convirtiéndose en Maestro de Teología en 1256. Por el resto de su corta vida, el “buey mudo”, como así lo llamaban, enseñó, predicó y escribió, produciendo su monumental obra "Summa Theologiae". Su manera de pensar influyó enormemente en los siglos posteriores y fue nombrado Doctor de la Iglesia en 1567.

“Con clarividente sabiduría santo Tomás de Aquino logró instaurar una confrontación fructuosa con el pensamiento árabe y judío de su tiempo, hasta tal punto que es considerado un maestro siempre actual de diálogo con las demás culturas y religiones. Supo presentar la admirable síntesis cristiana entre razón y fe, que para la civilización occidental representa un valioso patrimonio, al que se puede acudir también hoy para dialogar de modo eficaz con las grandes tradiciones culturales y religiosas del este y del sur del mundo”. interacciones con aquellos que encontró en su ministerio.

Lucas comienza reconociendo que no es el único para registrar las palabras y hechos de Jesús. Probablemente escribió su Evangelio alrededor del 85 d.C. Como en Los Hechos de los Apostoles, su otra obra, Lucas dedica su Evangelio a un tal Teófilo. Si se trataba o no de un personaje histórico, los estudiosos aún tienen que determinarlo. El Evangelio de hoy va más allá de las narraciones de la infancia al capítulo 4, que bien podría titularse el discurso inaugural de Jesús . En la sinagoga de su ciudad natal, se le pide a Jesús leer el pasaje semanal de los profetas. Cualquier hombre adulto en la congregación podría ser elegido para ese honor y luego se esperaba que comentara la lectura; es decir, dar la homilía o una reflexión. El pasaje de Isaías era familiar para todos los que lo escuchaban. Sus comentarios fueron breves, pero muchos no lo aceptaron como aprenderemos la próxima semana. Sin embargo, como en los discursos inaugurales modernos, Jesús aquí presenta su plataforma, diciendo a sus amigos y vecinos lo que pueden esperar de él en las semanas, meses y los próximos años. Comienza su vida pública con una muy pública declaración de propósito.

En el transcurso de las próximas 30+ semanas del Tiempo Ordinario, recorreremos la versión de Lucas de la vida pública de Jesús. El Tiempo Ordinario en este sentido simplemente significa los domingos ordinales o numerados, y esta temporada es tan importante como cualquier otro en el año litúrgico ya que contiene la enseñanzas e
