The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Jesus. June 19

1st Reading: Gn 14: 18-20 Psalm 110 2nd Reading: 1 Cor 11:23-26 Gospel: Lk 9: 11b-17

“Give them some food yourselves”



Today, the second Sunday after Pentecost, we celebrate a second solemnity, which marks our return to Ordinary Time. Today is the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ. At one time, this day was called *Corpus Christi*, Latin for “the Body of Christ.” In the most recent revision of the liturgy, the name for this day is expanded to be a more complete reflection of our Eucharistic theology.

The feeding of the 5,000 is the only one of Jesus' miracles to appear in all four Gospels. In Luke the feeding is not the result of Jesus' compassion for the crowd but is instigated by the disciples. They wanted Jesus to send the crowd away to town. Instead Jesus tells the disciples to give them some food on their own.

The passage is meant to remind us of two feedings in the Old Testament: the feeding of the Israelites in the desert and Elisha's feeding of 100 people with 20 loaves in 2 Kings 4:42-44. It is also connected to the institution of the Eucharist. As in the Last Supper accounts in Matthew, Mark, and Luke and in Paul's account in 1 Corinthians 11:23-24, Jesus takes bread, looks up to heaven, blesses the bread, breaks it, and then gives it to the disciples. In using this exact language, Luke is reminding his readers that in this miracle Jesus is doing more than feeding hungry people as God did for the Israelites and the prophet Elisha did as well. The bread he gives is his body, which he will continue to give as often as the community breaks bread in remembrance of him in the Eucharist.

The 11:15am Mass will begin on the normal time.

In our Parish we will also have some events related with the Eucharist Revival.



**Saint of the week: June 22nd
St. Thomas More**



Thomas More was born in 1477, the son of a lawyer in London. He planned to become a priest but then entered law school. His three daughters, son, and friends helped make his home a happy place.

Besides being a shrewd lawyer, Thomas was a charming, witty man, who won the friendship of the king. Henry VIII began his rule of England as a devout king. Later, King Henry asked Thomas to approve of the divorce he wanted. Thomas refused. Of course, the king became angry. By this time, Thomas had become chancellor of England. Henry wanted Thomas on his side. Then when every bishop except John Fisher signed the Oath of Supremacy, Thomas refused to sign. He resigned as chancellor and retired to his country home, hoping for a quiet life with his family.

Thomas, however, was sent to prison. He was kept for more than a year in the Tower of London. The king tried hard to make him change his mind, but Thomas stood firm. He knew this stand would mean certain death for him and disgrace for his family, but he followed his conscience. Finally, after suffering hunger, cold, and loneliness, Thomas was led out to be beheaded on July 6. Seeing that the masked swordsman was quite nervous, Thomas said, "Be not afraid, for you send me to God." Then he said to the crowd, "I die the king's good servant, but God's first."

Thomas, sin embargo, fue enviado a prisión. Estuvo más de un año en la Torre de Londres. El rey se esforzó por hacerle cambiar de opinión, pero Tomás se mantuvo firme. Sabía que esta posición significaría una muerte segura para él y la desgracia para su familia, pero siguió su conciencia. Finalmente, después de sufrir hambre, frío y soledad, Thomas fue llevado para ser decapitado el 6 de julio. Al ver que el espadachín enmascarado estaba bastante nervioso, Thomas dijo: "No temas, porque tú me envías a Dios". Entonces dijo a la multitud: Muero como buen siervo del rey, pero primero de Dios.

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**Santo de la semana: Junio 22
San Thomas More**

Thomas More nació en 1477, hijo de un abogado en Londres. Planeaba convertirse en sacerdote, pero luego ingresó a la facultad de derecho. Sus tres hijas, su hijo y sus amigos ayudaron a hacer de su hogar un lugar feliz.

Además de ser un abogado astuto, Tomás era un hombre encantador e ingenioso que se ganó la amistad del rey. Enrique VIII comenzó su gobierno de Inglaterra como un rey devoto. Más tarde, el rey Enrique le pidió a Thomas que aprobara el divorcio que quería. Tomás se negó. Por supuesto, el rey se enojó. En ese momento, Thomas se había convertido en canciller de Inglaterra. Henry quería a Thomas de su lado. Luego, cuando todos los obispos excepto John Fisher firmaron el Juramento de Supremacía, Thomas se negó a firmar. Renunció como canciller y se retiró a su casa de campo, con la esperanza de una vida tranquila con su familia.

Solemnidad del Cuerpo y la Sangre de Cristo

1era. Lectura: Gn. 14, 18-20 **Salmo:** 109; **2da. Lectura:** 1 Cor 11, 23-26 **Evangelio:** Lc 9 11-17

"Denles ustedes de comer"

Hoy, segundo domingo después de Pentecostés, celebramos una segunda solemnidad, que marca nuestro regreso al Tiempo Ordinario. Hoy es la Solemnidad del Santísimo Cuerpo y Sangre de Cristo. Hubo un tiempo en que este día se llamaba Corpus Christi, en latín "el Cuerpo de Cristo". En la revisión más reciente de la liturgia, se amplía el nombre de este día para que sea un reflejo más completo de nuestra teología eucarística.

La alimentación de los 5.000 es el único de los milagros de Jesús que aparece en los cuatro Evangelios. En Lucas, la alimentación no es el resultado de la compasión de Jesús por la multitud, sino que es instigada por los discípulos. Querían que Jesús enviara a la multitud a la ciudad. En cambio, Jesús les dice a los discípulos que les den algo de comer por su cuenta.

El pasaje está destinado a recordarnos dos alimentaciones en el Antiguo Testamento: la alimentación de los israelitas en el desierto y la alimentación de Eliseo de 100 personas con 20 panes en 2 Reyes 4:42-44. También está conectado a la institución de la Eucaristía. Como en los relatos de la Última Cena en Mateo, Marcos y Lucas y en el relato de Pablo en 1 Corintios 11:23-24, Jesús toma el pan, mira al cielo, bendice el pan, lo parte y luego se lo da a los discípulos. Al usar este lenguaje exacto, Lucas está recordando a sus lectores que en este milagro Jesús está haciendo más que alimentar a las personas hambrientas como Dios hizo por los israelitas y también lo hizo el profeta Eliseo. El pan que da es su cuerpo, que seguirá dando cuantas veces la comunidad parta el pan en memoria de él en la Eucaristía.
