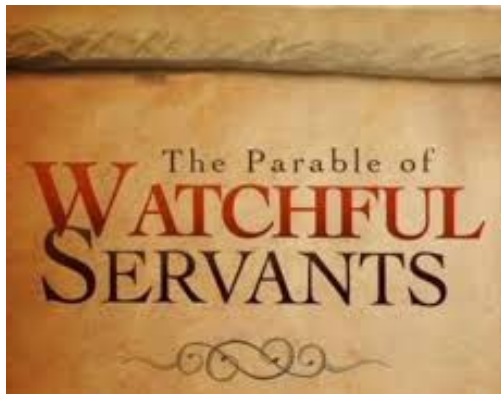


Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Catholic Church

Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time. August 7, 2022

1st Reading: Wis. 18: 6-9 Psalm 33 2nd Reading: Heb. 11:1-12, 8-19 Gospel: Lk 12: 32-48

“Faith is the realization of what is hoped for”



Jesus' instructions on how to be ready for the coming judgment continue in the stories and sayings found in today's Gospel. The antidote for the anxiety brought on by the coming judgment is to relinquish our possessions and provide for the needs of others. Our treasure will be in heaven where it will not wear out or be destroyed.

The other major way to be ready for the coming judgment is to be watchful. In Luke's Gospel, Jesus tells a parable about watchfulness to begin making this point. We must be like servants waiting for the master's return from a wedding banquet, which, even now, can last for a few days in the Middle East. We must be watchful so that even if the master comes after midnight, we will be ready for him. This is what the coming of the Son of Man will be like.

Peter asks if this parable is meant for the apostles or for the large crowd that has gathered to listen to Jesus. Without answering Peter's question, Jesus responds with another parable about servants awaiting the return of their master. It begins with a question: "Who, then, is the faithful and prudent steward whom the master will put in charge of his servants to distribute the food allowance at the proper time?" This parable adds to the theme of watchfulness; it explains how to wait and reminds us of the reward for the faithful follower at the heavenly banquet after the judgment. If it is addressed to the apostles, then it could also be addressed to leadership in the early Church. Either way, the parables reminds us that we should be found doing our jobs when the master arrives. If we are doing our jobs, our reward will be great. But if we relax, neglect our duties, and begin to act like the greedy rich man—eating, drinking, and

making merry—we will not have a place in the kingdom. Watchfulness means living in such a consistently moral and obedient way that we are always ready to give an account to God of how we have lived. Loyola Press

In August we stand with Africa.

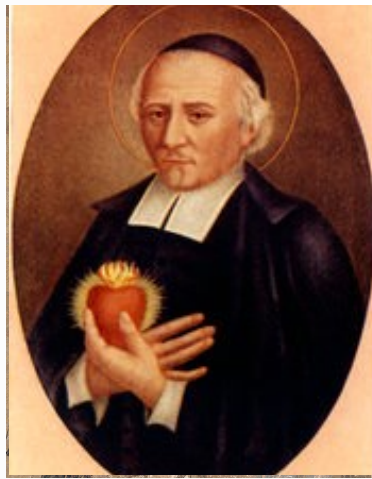

John, born in Normandy, France, in 1601, was educated by Jesuits. He became a priest and joined a religious community, the Oratorians. Using his gifts as a preacher and confessor, he gave parish missions. He saw that parish priests needed support in becoming men of prayer and action. He held conferences for them in which he outlined their duties. Later, John started his own society of priests called the Congregation of Jesus and Mary. The members were dedicated to promoting good seminary training, which would form Christlike priests.

John, nacido en Normandía, Francia, en 1601, fue educado por los jesuitas. Se hizo sacerdote y se unió a una comunidad religiosa, los oratorianos. Usando sus dones como predicador y confesor, dio misiones parroquiales. Vio que los párrocos necesitaban apoyo para convertirse en hombres de oración y acción. Celebró conferencias para ellos en las que describió sus funciones. Más tarde, Juan fundó su propia sociedad de sacerdotes llamada Congregación de Jesús y María. Los miembros se dedicaron a promover una buena formación en el seminario, que formaría sacerdotes semejantes a Cristo.

To serve the women who were trying to escape prostitution, he established a society of religious women called the Congregation of Our Lady of the Refuge. It now serves the needs of troubled girls around the world.

XIX Domingo del Tiempo Ordinario

1era. Lectura: Sab. 18, 6-9 **Salmo:** 32; **2da.Lectura:** Heb. 11, 1-2. 8-12 **Evangelio:** Lc 12, 32-48

“La fe es la garantía de lo que se espera”

Las instrucciones de Jesús sobre cómo estar preparados para el juicio final continúan en las historias y dichos que se encuentran en el Evangelio de hoy. El antídoto para la ansiedad provocada por el juicio final es renunciar a nuestras posesiones y proveer para las necesidades de los demás. Nuestro tesoro estará en el cielo donde no se desgastará ni se destruirá.

La otra forma principal de estar listo para el juicio venidero es estar alerta. En el Evangelio de Lucas, Jesús cuenta una parábola sobre la vigilancia para comenzar a señalar este punto. Debemos ser como sirvientes que esperan el regreso del amo de un banquete de bodas que, incluso ahora, puede durar unos días en el Medio Oriente. Debemos estar atentos para que aunque el maestro venga después de la medianoche, estemos listos para él. Así será la venida del Hijo del Hombre.

Pedro pregunta si esta parábola es para los apóstoles o para la gran multitud que se ha reunido para escuchar a Jesús. Sin responder a la pregunta de Pedro, Jesús responde con otra parábola sobre los siervos que esperan el regreso de su amo. Comienza con una pregunta: “¿Quién, pues, es el mayordomo fiel y prudente, a quien el amo pondrá a cargo de sus siervos para repartir la ración a su debido tiempo?” Esta parábola se suma al tema de la vigilancia; explica cómo esperar y nos recuerda la recompensa para el seguidor fiel en el banquete celestial después del juicio. Si está dirigida a los apóstoles, entonces también podría estar dirigida al liderazgo de la Iglesia primitiva. De cualquier manera, las parábolas nos recuerdan que debemos estar haciendo nuestro trabajo cuando llegue el maestro. Si estamos haciendo nuestro trabajo, nuestra recompensa será grande. Pero si nos relajamos, descuidamos nuestros deberes y comenzamos a actuar como el hombre rico codicioso, comiendo, bebiendo y divirtiéndonos, no tendremos un lugar en el reino. Vigilancia significa vivir de una manera tan consistentemente moral y obediente que estemos siempre listos para dar cuenta
