Third Sunday of Advent December 11th, 2022



"Rejoice in the Lord always"

Phíl 4: 4-5

This week's Gospel Reading continues our Advent reflection on the person and message of John the Baptist. Last week we heard John speak about his relationship to the coming Messiah, Jesus. This week, we hear Jesus' message to John the Baptist, now in prison, about the signs of the kingdom found in Jesus' ministry and Jesus' assessment of John's role in the Kingdom of God.

In today's Gospel, John sends word to Jesus from prison, asking if Jesus is the Messiah for whom he has been waiting. Jesus responds by pointing to the miracles that he has worked and invites John and the other hearers to make their own determination. In his next breath, however, Jesus praises John for his role in preparing the way for Jesus. Then Jesus says that all of those who work for the Kingdom of God will be as great as John and even greater.

Jesus' message to John about the signs of the kingdom being performed recalls the salvation described by the prophet Isaiah. This passage is a reminder that the beginning of salvation is already mysteriously present to us, but also yet to be fulfilled. Salvation is already in our midst as manifest in the miraculous deeds of Jesus and in the Church. But salvation is also to be fulfilled in the coming reign of God. Even as we observe our world today, we can find glimpses of God's work among us. Even more, we help to prepare the way for God's kingdom by our words and our deeds. This message is indeed a cause for rejoicing.

La Lectura del Evangelio de esta semana continúa nuestra reflexión de Adviento sobre la persona y el mensaje de Juan el Bautista. La semana pasada escuchamos a Juan hablar sobre su relación con el Mesías venidero, Jesús. Esta semana, escuchamos el mensaje de Jesús a Juan el Bautista, ahora en prisión, sobre las señales del reino que se encuentran en el ministerio de Jesús y la evaluación de Jesús del papel de Juan en el Reino de Dios.

En el Evangelio de hoy, Juan envía un mensaje a Jesús desde la prisión, preguntándole si Jesús es el Mesías que ha estado esperando. Jesús responde señalando los milagros que ha obrado e invita a Juan ya los demás oyentes a tomar su propia determinación. Sin embargo, en su siguiente aliento, Jesús alaba a Juan por su papel en la preparación del camino para Jesús. Entonces Jesús dice que todos los que trabajen por el Reino de Dios serán tan grandes como Juan y aún mayores.

El mensaje de Jesús a Juan sobre las señales del reino que se están realizando recuerda la salvación descrita por el profeta Isaías. Este pasaje es un recordatorio de que el comienzo de la salvación ya está misteriosamente presente para nosotros, pero también está por cumplirse. La salvación ya está entre nosotros como se manifiesta en las obras milagrosas de Jesús y en la Iglesia. Pero la salvación también se cumplirá en el reinado venidero de Dios. Incluso mientras observamos nuestro mundo hoy, podemos encontrar vislumbres de la obra de Dios entre nosotros. Más aún, ayudamos a preparar el camino para el reino de Dios con nuestras palabras y nuestras obras. Este mensaje es ciertamente motivo de regocijo.

GAUDETE SUNDAY

The third Sunday of Advent is traditionally called *Gaudete Sunday*. *Gaudete* is the Latin word meaning "rejoice." This Sunday is so named because "Rejoice" is the first word in the entrance antiphon for today's Mass taken from Philippians 4:4,5: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice! The Lord is near." Some people mark this Sunday on their Advent wreath with a pink candle instead of a purple candle. This Sunday is a joyful reminder that our salvation is near.

OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE

On December 9, 1531, a 57-year-old Aztec, Juan Diego, saw the Blessed Mother on a hill in Mexico City. She told Juan to have a church built in her honor. When Juan went to ask Bishop Zumarraga about this, the bishop did not understand the Indian dialect—and he did not believe in the vision Juan described.

Three days later, on December 12, Mary appeared again to Juan Diego, and this time she gave him a sign for the bishop. "Take these roses to the bishop," she said, as she arranged in his cloak beautiful roses she had Juan Diego pick from the hillside although it was winter. When he was admitted into the bishop's room, Juan Diego opened his cloak, and out dropped the roses. On the cloak there remained an image of Mary as she had appeared to Juan Diego.

The image of Mary on the cloak is known as Our Lady of Guadalupe for an interesting reason. On that same day, Mary appeared to Juan's uncle and cured him, giving him a message for the bishop, saying that she would "crush the serpent's head." The bishop did not understand the Indians' language. The Indian word for "crush the serpent" sounded to him like "Guadalupe," the name of Mary's shrine in Spain. Thinking that the Virgin wanted the new shrine to have the same name, the bishop called her Our Lady of Guadalupe.

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
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
