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THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME B. JAN. 21ST 2024 "I WILL MAKE YOU FISHERS OF MEN"

Today we begin a continuous reading of Mark's Gospel that will carry us through this segment of the liturgical season of Ordinary Time. Remember that in Cycle B of the Lectionary, most of the Gospel readings are taken from the Gospel according to Mark. Jesus' public ministry begins after the arrest of John the Baptist. Mark wants his readers to understand the important connection between the end of the ministry of John the Baptist and the beginning of Jesus' own ministry.

As we learn at the beginning of today's Gospel reading, Jesus preaches the Kingdom of God in continuity with the preaching of John the Baptist. Like John the Baptist, Jesus' pronouncement of the kingdom is a call to repentance. Yet Jesus' preaching is greater than John's. Jesus begins the time of fulfillment; the Kingdom of God is already here. This will be demonstrated again and again, both in Jesus' words and in the actions that follow. Jesus' healings and forgiveness of sins are signs of the Kingdom of God that he

announces in his teaching.

In contrast to last week's Gospel, in Mark's Gospel Jesus takes the initiative in calling his first disciples. As mentioned last week, it was more typical of first-century rabbinical schools for students to seek out rabbis, asking to be their disciples. In Mark's Gospel, Jesus breaks with this tradition and invites his disciples to learn from him. Jesus is said to have first called four fishermen—Simon, Andrew, James, and John. Simon and Andrew are brothers. Jesus promises that he will make them "fishers of men." James and John are also brothers. Mark does not report Jesus' words of invitation to them, but he does report that they left their fishing immediately; their father, Zebedee, was left behind in the boat.

Mark's Gospel is told with a great sense of urgency and immediacy. Jesus is a person of action, and events occur in rapid succession. We see this in today's Gospel. Time is of the essence; the fishermen immediately put aside their livelihood to become Jesus' disciples. The Kingdom of God is here and now. The time of fulfillment is at hand. How might our lives be different if we more fully shared this sense of the immediacy of God's kingdom?

III DOMINGO DEL TIEMPO ORDINARIO B "SÍGANME Y HARÉ DE USTEDES PESCADORES DE HOMBRES"

Hoy comenzamos una lectura continua del Evangelio de Marcos que nos llevará a través de este segmento del tiempo litúrgico del Tiempo Ordinario. Recuerde que en el Ciclo B del Leccionario, la mayoría de las lecturas del Evangelio están tomadas del Evangelio según Marcos. El ministerio público de Jesús comienza después del arresto de Juan el Bautista. Marcos quiere que sus lectores comprendan la importante conexión entre el fin del ministerio de Juan el Bautista y el comienzo del propio ministerio de Jesús.

Como aprendemos al comienzo de la lectura del Evangelio de hoy, Jesús predica el Reino de Dios en continuidad con la predicación de Juan el Bautista. Al igual que Juan el Bautista, el pronunciamiento de Jesús sobre el reino es un llamado al arrepentimiento. Sin embargo, la predicación de Jesús es mayor que la de Juan. Jesús inicia el tiempo del cumplimiento; el Reino de Dios ya está aquí. Esto quedará demostrado una y otra vez, tanto en las palabras de Jesús como en las acciones que siguen. Las curaciones y el perdón de los pecados de Jesús son signos del Reino de Dios que anuncia en su enseñanza.

A diferencia del Evangelio de la semana pasada, en el Evangelio de Marcos Jesús toma la iniciativa de llamar a sus primeros discípulos. Como se mencionó la semana pasada, era más típico de las escuelas rabínicas del siglo I que los estudiantes buscaran rabinos y les pidieran ser sus discípulos. En el evangelio de Marcos, Jesús rompe con esta tradición e invita a sus discípulos a aprender de él. Se dice que Jesús llamó primero a cuatro pescadores: Simón, Andrés, Santiago y Juan. Simón y Andrés son hermanos. Jesús promete que los hará "pescadores de hombres". James y John también son hermanos. Marcos no informa las palabras de invitación de Jesús, pero sí informa que dejaron de pescar inmediatamente; Su padre, Zebedeo, se quedó en la barca.

El evangelio de Marcos está narrado con un gran sentido de urgencia e inmediatez. Jesús es una persona de acción y los acontecimientos ocurren en rápida sucesión. Vemos esto en el Evangelio de hoy. El tiempo es la esencia; Los pescadores inmediatamente dejaron de lado su sustento para convertirse en discípulos de Jesús. El Reino de Dios está aquí y ahora. El tiempo del cumplimiento está cerca. ¿Cómo podrían ser diferentes nuestras vidas si compartiéramos más plenamente



SAINT OF THE WEEK: JAN. 26TH SAINT TITUS

St. Paul spoke with great affection and respect for St. Titus. He addressed him as "true child of mine in the faith that we share," suggesting that he had personally recruited Titus for Christ (see Titus 1:14). So Titus became one of Paul's most trusted colleagues, serving as his secretary, traveling companion, and ambassador. He accompanied



Paul at the Council of Jerusalem that decided not to require circumcision of Jewish converts. To strengthen his case that gentile Christians need not become Jews first, Paul had refused to circumcise Titus, who was Greek.

When Paul discovered the sex scandal and subsequent dissension at Corinth, he sent Titus to deal with the situation. Apparently a gifted pastoral leader, he successfully brought the community through its ordeal. Afterwards Paul told the Corinthians of Titus's affection for them that was "all the stronger when he remembers how obedient you have all been, and how you welcomed him with fear and trembling" (2 Corinthians 7:15 NJB).

Paul appointed Titus the first bishop of Crete, assigning him to consolidate the church there by appointing elders in every town. Paul had low regard for Cretans and accepted a popular view that generally they were "liars, dangerous animals, all greed and laziness" (Titus 1:12)
