



# OUR LADY OF MOUNT CARMEL CATHOLIC CHURCH

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## FOURTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME 'B' – JULY 7TH 2024 "THEY SHALL KNOW THAT A PROPHET HAS BEEN AMONG THEM" EZ. 2,5

Today's Gospel describes what many believe to have been the typical pattern of Jesus' ministry: teaching in the synagogue followed by acts of healing. In his hometown of Nazareth, the people are amazed by what they hear, but they also cannot comprehend how someone they know so well might move them so powerfully.

In this Gospel, we learn some interesting details about Jesus and his early life. Jesus' kinfolk know him to be a carpenter, an artisan who works in wood, stone, and metal. He probably learned this trade from his father. Family members of Jesus are also named. Mark describes Jesus as the son of Mary, which is an unusual designation. Adult males were more typically identified with the name of their fathers. It is unclear why Mark deviates from this custom.

Brothers and sisters of Jesus are also named. Scholars are divided on how to interpret this. As Catholics, we believe that Mary was and remained always a virgin, thus we do not believe that this Gospel refers to other children of Mary. Some have suggested that these family members might be Joseph's children from a previous marriage, but there is little evidence to support this. Others explain this reference by noting that the words brother and sister were often used to refer to other types of relatives, including cousins, nieces, and nephews.

This Gospel tells us that Jesus is hampered from performing miracles in Nazareth because of the people's lack of faith. Jesus is said to be surprised by this. He did not predict or foresee this rejection. In this detail we find a description of the very human side of Jesus.

This passage unfolds a continuing theme of Mark's Gospel: Who is Jesus? His kinfolk in Nazareth might know the carpenter, the son of Mary, but they do not know Jesus, the Son of God. Mark is foreshadowing Jesus' rejection by his own people, the people of Israel. He is also reflecting on and trying to explain the situation of the community for which he wrote. While many of the first Christians were Jewish, Christianity took hold and flourished in the Gentile community. Mark's community was mostly a Gentile community, who may have been experiencing persecution. By showing that Jesus himself was rejected, Mark consoles and reassures his first readers. He also prepares us to accept this possible consequence of Christian discipleship.

## XIV DOMINGO ORDINARIO 'B' "SABRÁN QUE HAY UN PROFETA EN MEDIO DE ELLOS". EZ. 2,5

El Evangelio de hoy describe lo que muchos creen que fue el patrón típico del ministerio de Jesús: enseñanza en la sinagoga seguida de actos de curación. En su ciudad natal de Nazaret, la gente queda asombrada por lo que escucha, pero tampoco puede comprender cómo alguien que conocen tan bien puede conmoverlos tan poderosamente.



En este Evangelio, aprendemos algunos detalles interesantes sobre Jesús y sus primeros años de vida. Los familiares de Jesús saben que es carpintero, un artesano que trabaja en madera, piedra y metal. Probablemente aprendió este oficio de su padre. También se nombran familiares de Jesús. Marcos describe a Jesús como el hijo de María, lo cual es una designación inusual. Los varones adultos se identificaban más típicamente con el nombre de sus padres. No está claro por qué Mark se desvía de esta costumbre.

También se nombran hermanos y hermanas de Jesús. Los estudiosos están divididos sobre cómo interpretar esto. Como católicos, creemos que María fue y permaneció siempre virgen, por lo que no creemos que este Evangelio se refiera a otros hijos de María. Algunos han sugerido que estos miembros de la familia podrían ser hijos de José de un matrimonio anterior, pero hay poca evidencia que respalde esto. Otros explican esta referencia señalando que las palabras hermano y hermana se usaban a menudo para referirse a otros tipos de parientes, incluidos primos, sobrinas y sobrinos.

Este Evangelio nos dice que Jesús no puede realizar milagros en Nazaret debido a la falta de fe de la gente. Se dice que Jesús se sorprendió por esto. No predijo ni previó este rechazo. En este detalle encontramos una descripción del lado muy humano de Jesús.

Este pasaje desarrolla un tema continuo del Evangelio de Marcos: ¿Quién es Jesús? Sus parientes en Nazaret pueden conocer al carpintero, el hijo de María, pero no conocen a Jesús, el Hijo de Dios. Marcos presagia el rechazo de Jesús por parte de su propio pueblo, el pueblo de Israel. También reflexiona y trata de explicar la situación de la comunidad para la que escribe. Si bien muchos de los primeros cristianos eran judíos, el cristianismo se afianzó y floreció en la comunidad gentil. La comunidad de Marcos era principalmente una comunidad gentil, que pudo haber estado experimentando persecución. Al mostrar que el mismo Jesús fue rechazado, Marcos consuela y tranquiliza a sus primeros lectores. También nos prepara para aceptar esta posible consecuencia del discipulado cristiano.

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### SAINT OF THE WEEK: JULY 11TH: SAINT BENEDICT

(Born c. 480 CE, Nursia [Italy]—  
died c. 547, Monte Cassino.

St. Benedict was the founder of the Benedictine monastery at Monte Cassino and father of Western monasticism; the Rule (*this simple set of guidelines for how the life of a monk should be lived has become one of the most influential works in all of Western Christendom*) that he established became the norm for monastic living throughout Europe. In 1964, in view of the work of monks following the Benedictine Rule in the evangelization and civilization of so many European countries in the Middle Ages, Pope Paul VI proclaimed him the patron saint of all Europe.



You may have noticed we have a beautiful piano in our music alcove. Thanks to the advocacy Spencer Williams, one of our pianists and the York School Music Director, York School donated this gem to Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Parish last May.

This Blüthner piano was made in Leipzig, Germany in 1908. Leipzig has a rich musical heritage, with Johann Sebastian Bach, Richard Wagner, Gustav Mahler and Robert and Clara Schumann having ties to this city.

We don't know when it made the voyage to the USA, or how it came to York School, but now it is ours. Although over a hundred years old, it is in excellent playing condition, and has recently been tuned. Pat Dowd, a choir member, polished its exterior and it now shines like new. It's likely this old beauty will bring prayerful music to our church for very long time.
