


SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME "C"—FEB. 23RD 2025 "HE FIRST MAN, ADAM, BECAME A LIVING BEING, THE LAST ADAM A LIFE-GIVING SPIRIT" 1 CORINTHIANS 15:45

Today's gospel reading is a continuation of the teaching that began in last Sunday's gospel. We continue to hear Jesus' Sermon on the Plain.

These words from Jesus' teaching are familiar to us. They constitute the crux and the challenge of what it means to be a disciple: Love your enemies, turn the other cheek, give to those who ask, do unto others, lend without expecting repayment, judge not lest you be judged.

There are several similarities between Luke's and Matthew's report of Jesus' great teaching. Both begin with the Beatitudes. Matthew includes nearly all the content that Luke does; the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew's Gospel is longer than Luke's Sermon on the Plain. There are, however, differences in language and nuance. For example, Matthew presents this portion of the teaching as a contrast between Jesus' teaching and the teachings of the law and the prophets. This is in keeping with Matthew's concern to address his predominantly Jewish audience. It is likely that Luke omits this contrast because it was unnecessary for the Gentile believers for whom Luke is writing.



Another point of contrast between Matthew and Luke's presentation is the terminology. In Luke, Jesus contrasts the behavior of his followers with the behavior of "sinners." In Matthew, Jesus contrasts the behavior desired with the behavior of tax collectors and Gentiles. Matthew concludes the teaching about love of enemies with the admonition to be perfect as God is perfect; Luke concludes by emphasizing God's mercy.

In both Gospels, Jesus' words challenge those who would follow him to be more like God. God loves us beyond our expectations, beyond anything we can possibly imagine. In response to God's love, we are to love as God loves, beyond expectations and with a depth beyond imagining. Loyola Press

Our Lady of Mt. Carmel is restarting our" Shining Star" college scholarship program.

This outreach was instituted in 2011 by Fr. Emil Robu and several parishioners as a need-based effort to assist those young people who may be struggling to afford the high costs of books and college classes.

The remaining designated funds have been untouched since 2021. We now hope to identify those students whose goals include either community college or a four year degree. All will be asked to submit a statement of eligibility as well as a personal testimony. A few of the applications already received speak about family hardships, deaths of a parent and financial struggles far beyond what a teen should be dealing with.

VII DOMINGO ORDINARIO 'C" — FEB. 23RD, 2025 EL PRIMER HOMBRE, ADÁN, FUE UN SER QUE TUVO VIDA; EL ÚLTIMO ADÁN ES ESPÍRITU QUE DA LA VIDA 1 CORINTIOS 15, 45

La lectura del evangelio de hoy es una continuación de la enseñanza que comenzó en el evangelio del domingo pasado. Seguimos escuchando el Sermón de la Llanura de Jesús.

Estas palabras de la enseñanza de Jesús nos son familiares. Constituyen el quid y el desafío de lo que significa ser un discípulo: ama a tus enemigos, pon la otra mejilla, da a los que te piden, hazlo con los demás, presta sin esperar pago, no juzgues para que no te juzguen.

Hay varias similitudes entre el informe de Lucas y Mateo sobre la gran enseñanza de Jesús. Ambos comienzan con las Bienaventuranzas. Mateo incluye casi todo el contenido que incluye Lucas; El Sermón de la Montaña en el Evangelio de Mateo es más largo que el Sermón de la Llanura de Lucas. Sin embargo, existen diferencias en el lenguaje y los matices. Por ejemplo, Mateo presenta esta parte de la enseñanza como un contraste entre las enseñanzas de Jesús y las enseñanzas de la ley y los profetas. Esto está en consonancia con la preocupación de Mateo por dirigirse a su audiencia predominantemente judía. Es probable que Lucas omita este contraste porque era innecesario para los creyentes gentiles para quienes Lucas escribe.

Otro punto de contraste entre la presentación de Mateo y Lucas es la terminología. En Lucas, Jesús contrasta el comportamiento de sus seguidores con el comportamiento de los "pecadores". En Mateo, Jesús contrasta el comportamiento deseado con el comportamiento de los recaudadores de impuestos y de los gentiles. Mateo concluye la enseñanza sobre el amor a los enemigos con la advertencia de ser perfectos como Dios es perfecto; Lucas concluye enfatizando la misericordia de Dios.

En ambos evangelios, las palabras de Jesús desafían a quienes lo seguirían a ser más como Dios. Dios nos ama más allá de nuestras expectativas, más allá de cualquier cosa que podamos imaginar. En respuesta al amor de Dios, debemos amar como Dios ama, más allá de las expectativas y con una profundidad más allá de lo imaginable.
