THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT – III DOMINGO DE CUAREMA "C" MARCH 23TH 2025 I SHALL CULTIVATE THE GROUND AROUND IT AND FERTILIZE IT; IT MAY BEAR FRUIT IN THE FUTURE

Now into the third week of the Season of Lent, our Sunday Gospel prepares us to hear Lent's call to conversion and repentance. Luke tells us that some among the crowds report to Jesus a massacre of Galileans by Pilate. The intention of the crowd seems to be to ask Jesus to explain why these people suffered. It was commonplace to render people's suffering as evidence of their sinfulness. Jesus challenges this interpretation. Those who were massacred were no more or less sinful than the ones who report the situation to Jesus. Jesus replies that even a fatal accident, a natural disaster, ought not to be interpreted as punishment for sin.

The parable of the barren fig tree contrasts the patience and hopefulness of the gardener with the practicality of the property owner. When told to cut down the fig tree because it is not producing fruit, the gardener counsels patience. If properly tended, the barren fig tree may yet bear fruit.

Throughout his journey to Jerusalem, Jesus has been teaching about the Kingdom of God. In this parable, we find an image of God's patience and hopefulness as he prepares his Kingdom. God calls us to repent, and it is within his power to punish us for our failure to turn from our sinfulness. And yet God is merciful. He delays punishment and tends to us so that we may yet bear the fruit he desires from us. This, then, is our reason for hope: Not only does God refuse to abandon us, he chooses to attend to us even when we show no

evidence of his efforts. Loyola Press.

ÉVOY A AFLOJAR LA TIERRA Alrededor y a echarle abono, para ver si da fruto"

Ya en la tercera semana del tiempo de Cuaresma, nuestro Evangelio dominical nos prepara para escuchar el llamado de la Cuaresma a la conversión y al arrepentimiento. Lucas nos cuenta que algunos entre la multitud reportan a Jesús una masacre de galileos a manos de Pilato. La intención de la multitud parece ser pedirle a Jesús que explique el sufrimiento de estas personas. Era común presentar el sufrimiento de las



personas como evidencia de su pecado. Jesús desafía esta interpretación. Quienes fueron masacrados no eran ni más ni menos pecadores que quienes le reportaron la situación a Jesús. Jesús responde que ni siquiera un accidente fatal, un desastre natural, debe interpretarse como castigo por el pecado.

La parábola de la higuera estéril contrasta la paciencia y la esperanza del jardinero con el sentido práctico del dueño de la propiedad. Cuando se le dice que corte la higuera porque no da fruto, el jardinero aconseja paciencia. Si se cuida adecuadamente, la higuera estéril aún puede dar fruto.

A lo largo de su viaje a Jerusalén, Jesús ha estado enseñando sobre el Reino de Dios. En esta parábola, encontramos una imagen de la paciencia y la esperanza de Dios mientras prepara su Reino. Dios nos llama al arrepentimiento, y está en su poder castigarnos por no alejarnos de nuestros pecados. Y, sin embargo, Dios es misericordioso. Retrasa el castigo y nos cuida para que aún podamos dar el fruto que desea de nosotros. Esta es, entonces, nuestra razón de esperanza: Dios no solo se niega a abandonarnos, sino que elige atendernos incluso cuando no mostramos evidencia de sus esfuerzos.
